Wheat piles up, lifting crawls

Tardy buying ails mandis across the state, though govt claims smooth purchase

Complaints of tardy lifting of procured wheat seemed to be ailing mandis across the state even as the five government procuring agencies and traders purchased over 24.01 lakh metric tonnes of grain that had arrived in the mandis till Saturday.

While a spokesman of the Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs Department said the procurement was running smoothly in mandis, farmers maintained that space to offload wheat was gradually falling short and there was little in the name of arrangements in case of rain.

Sources in the department, however, said the lifting of procured wheat was slow since the rain during the last week had raised its moisture levels.

"We cannot store it while the moisture content is high and will have to wait to clear it till the moisture level reaches the acceptable limit. Other than this, there is absolutely no complaint from anywhere," said an official.

Meanwhile, e-procurement, launched with much fanfare Chief Minister Manohar Lal Khattar's district Karnal in 2016, seemed to have been given a quiet burial after the move was resisted by arhtiyas for two

successive years.

The sources said the government did not initiate any move to implement it during this wheat procurement season though it was in place as far as mustard procurement was concerned.

Space crunch

Sonepat: Lack of space at the purchase centre at Rajiv Gandhi Education City grounds in Rai has made it difficult for farmers to unload wheat. The glut has occurred because the wheat stock purchased has not been lifted for the past 4-5 days. Heaps of wheat purchased can be seen lying throughout the purchase centre. Unhappy over the situation, the commission agents blame the procurement agencies responsible for the state of affairs. Darya Ram Chauhan of Jakholi village said, "Large stock of wheat is lying here and there as there is no space in the purchase centre to unload fresh stock." Rahul, a purchasing official at HAFED, said the loading contractor had been instructed to provide vehicles for lifting wheat. oc

Wheat from Rajasthan, UP glut G'gram, Nuh markets

The arrival of wheat has trebled in the past few days at the grain markets in Farukh Nagar and Sohna. Wary of change in weather, farmers are arriving in large number to sell wheat. This has led to shortage of space in most of the mandis for unloading and stocking the grain.

Farmers allege the markets have been glutted with wheat from neighbouring Rajasthan and UP.

Chairman of the market committee Mohan Joval said over 1,400 farmers had registered online for procurement, but the number of farmers that have reached here in the past two-three days is way higher.

The situation is no different in the four grain markets of Nuh, Punhana,

Taudu and Ferozpur Jhirka. Here, a large number of local farmers are yet to bring their produce to the markets, which are already clogged with wheat from neighbouring states.

Farmers allege that commission agents Rajasthan and UP were buying wheat in their states at a lower price and selling the same to the government agencies here at higher rates. They also claim that local officials were exempting them from mandatory registration and market fee.

Farmers are also worried over extra grain cleaning charges levied by commission agents. "The commission agents filled moisture-laden wheat in bags and charged us extra for drying the grain. It is not our fault, if there are no sheds to store or plastic sheets for protecting wheat from rain," rued Yousuf Azim of Ghasera village.

Meanwhile, Principal Secretary Ankur Gupta visited Mewat mandi on Saturday and reprimanded local agents for the chaos.

Purchase anything but smooth

Farmers are facing harrowing time selling mustard produce at the grain market here. Long queues of farmers can be seen outside the HAFED office here a month after the procurement started.

Farmers complain mustard was being procured by arhtiyas in open auction at rates less than the prescribed MSP of Rs 4,000 per quintal. Apart from waiting from days, farmers are being asked to produce land record certified by a patwari

er, who is bedridden due to paralysis, to the market. But, the HAFED officials have reportedly told him that his brother will have to be present during purchase, which according to Krishan Singh is not possible.

Another farmer Jagdish of Balawas village faces similar predicament. Eighteen members of his family jointly own the land on which mustard was grown. "Now, the HAFED wants all the 18 members to be present in the mandi for verification and procurement. It's difficult to bring all of them here. I have no option, but to sell the produce at below MSP to the traders," said Jagdish.

A young farmer, Rajesh Singh of Bhiwani Rohillan

village, alleged that arhtiyas were selling mustard, which was procured from farmers at below MSP, to government agencies at MSP by showing the original documents of farmers.

Dharambir of Kanwari village said arhtiyas were weighing one kg less per quintal by citing high moisture content.

District Food and Supplies Commissioner (DFSC) Subhash Sihag said 80,000 metric tonne mustard and 1,00,000 metric tonne wheat had been procured by the government agencies in the district. "HAFED has fixed the procurement days of villages. A farmer can get the token and bring the produce on the prescribed day," he said.

Rain affects wheat ripening, slows arrival

Untimely rain and low temperature have affected the maturity of wheat crop, thereby slowing its arrival in various markets of the district. "Prolonged winter and untimely rain in March and April delayed the ripening of wheat crop in Yamunanagar district," said Satish Kumar Sharma, a progressive farmer of Dhaurang village.

As per reports, 31,272 metric tonne wheat has arrived in all the eight grain markets and five sub-grain markets of the district up to April 14 this year compared to 59,933 metric tonne wheat last year.

Meanwhile, farmers are demanding improvement in

facilities at the grain markets. Rambir Singh Chauhan, district president of Bhartiya Kisan Sangh, said there were no toilets at the grain markets in Jathlana and Gumthala. He said farmers had to go out in the open to attend nature's call, adding water coolers at the grain markets were not functional. "The grain markets do not have adequate number of sheds. Those available are being used by procurement agencies to stock the grain purchased. Farmers have no choice, but to store wheat in the open," said Chauhan.

Anil Kumar, a farmer of Lal Chhappar village, said the government should provide facility for the farmers to stay in the grain market.

"Most of the times, the farmers have to wait for their turn to sell produce. The government should make rest rooms in the grain markets, where farmers can rest till their crop is procured," said Anil Kumar. Farmers also said they had no problem in selling their crop at the grain markets in the district.

Surinder Kumar, District Food Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs Controller, Yamunanagar, said wheat arrival was gaining momentum. "Necessary arrangements have been made for farmers at the grain markets. If there is any shortcoming, we will rectify it," he said.
